EUROPEAN UNION PET TRAVEL - What You Need to Know

Following Brexit, EU Pet Passports are no longer valid. Instead, your pet will need an Animal Health Certificate (AHC) for travel to the EU.

Key Information:

- An AHC is required for each trip to the EU. It is valid:
 - o For **10 days from the date of issue** to leave the Isle of Man/UK
 - o For re-entry to the UK and travel within the EU for up to 4 months
- The date of issue is the date the vet signs the certificate at the health check appointment.

Requirements:

- Your dog, cat, or ferret must be microchipped
- Your pet must be vaccinated against rabies
 - o Pets must be at least 12 weeks old before receiving the rabies vaccine
 - You must wait 21 days after the primary rabies vaccination before travel
- You can include up to 5 pets on a single AHC
- Regular annual vaccinations are recommended but not mandatory
- You must submit your application at least 2 weeks before your intended travel date
- Book a health check and document issue appointment no more than 10 days before travel

Tapeworm Treatment:

- Required for pets travelling **directly to**:
 - o Finland
 - o Ireland
 - o Malta
 - o Northern Ireland
 - Norway
- Treatment must be administered by a vet and recorded in the AHC
- It must be given no less than 24 hours and no more than 120 hours (5 days) before arrival

At the EU Border / Northern Ireland:

You must enter through a **Travellers' Point of Entry** and present:

- The Animal Health Certificate
- Proof of:
 - o Microchipping
 - Rabies vaccination
 - Tapeworm treatment (if applicable)
- Certified copies of all documentation must also be carried
